

# Squeezebox Trivia

The push-pull scale of

the melodeon was invented by Christian Friedrich Ludwig Buschmann in Berlin in 1821. He was born into a family of musical instrument makers and inventors, and was exploring the potential of the free reed principle. First of all he had it in a thing you blew into, called variously 'Aura', 'Harmonica', or 'Mundaoline', and then he put it in a thing with bellows, called 'Handaoline', or 'Zieharmonica'. He had invented, and patented, the Mouth Organ and

the Melodeon, and the sickening thing is he was only sixteen years old.
